

EYFS Curriculum Overview

Our EYFS Curriculum outlines the knowledge and skills we want our children to gain over the course of the time they are with us. We follow the educational programmes as set out in the Statutory Framework for EYFS, and Development Matters, to provide activities and experiences that enable children to learn and develop, as set out under the seven areas of learning.

We have carefully considered what our Lutley children need to learn over time so it is a progressive model, based on children's prior knowledge, enabling them to reach our ambitious, yet achievable end points by the end of their time in Reception. Please see pages 17-23 in your child's planner that outline these end points in detail.

Our curriculum enables all children to make progress in all seven areas of learning, with communication and language at the heart. Children have the opportunity to really develop and talk about a full range of interests under topic umbrellas. Our broad and balanced curriculum builds on, and further develops, children's cultural capital by offering a plethora of enrichment opportunities, such as local visits around the area to meeting important people in society.
