This week your parents have received details of how you can login to myON. This is a great resource because it gives you access to thousands of books to read, quiz on and complete book reviews about. So far , in just 4 days, 359 books have been read and nearly 62 hours have been spent reading these books! That is amazing! However, lots of you still need to log in . This number represents about 60 children's reading and there are over 600 of you in school . At the time of writing, Year 2 had spent a fabulous 15 hours reading. This is 6 hours above year 4 who have spent 9 hours reading.

Look out for a reading task linked to myON set by your teachers next week! You will have information about this through Google Classrooms.

A reminder to mums and dads that ZPD ranges take 24 hours to synchronise with Accelerated Reader. They may look too low to begin with.



Concert Connects “One World”

Last Saturday, people across the planet tuned in on TVs and computers to watch the “One World: Together at Home” concert. More than 100 artists, including Taylor Swift, Billie Eilish and Elton John performed from their homes.

A group called Global Citizen organized the event with the World Health Organization. Singer Lady Gaga helped choose the performers, who came from all over the world. Millions of people enjoyed the show and the event also raised \$127 million to help fight the coronavirus.

Saturday’s event showed one way to bring people together — through music. More than 60 channels in about 180 countries showed the concert. The event was also on YouTube. By Monday afternoon, more than 25 million people had viewed it on that site.

Did you know?
Sign language dates back to the 1500's. It's now the UK's fourth indigenous language and is thought to be used by over 50,000 people countrywide.

British Sign Language

A **sign language** is a way of communicating by using the hands and other parts of the body. Sign languages are an important way for deaf people to communicate. Deaf people often use them instead of spoken languages. Spoken languages use sounds from the mouth and are understood with the ears. Sign languages use hands and are understood with the eyes. Deaf people can use sign languages more easily than spoken languages.

Sign languages are not universal. That means there is not one single sign language for all deaf people around the world. There are many different sign languages. Each deaf community can develop its own sign language. Usually there is a different sign language in each country. Linguists have identified at least 137 different sign languages.

This is British Sign language alphabet. There are also signs for whole words and phrases. What can you learn to sign?
